WE WELCOME YOU TODAY

We would like to remind our visitors of the following;:

- All people are encouraged to participate in the sacred services of our Church. We hope that you will be able to worship as well as have fellowship with us. Should you wish any information about the Orthodox Faith or this parish in particular, please see the rector or any member of the church. We are able to place you on our mailing list.
- Only Orthodox Christians may receive the Eucharist (Holy Communion) in the Orthodox Church. In like manner, Orthodox Christians may not receive the sacraments in an non-Orthodox Church. While we hope that one day all Christians will find unity and be able to approach the chalice of our Lord together, we observe the teachings of the Church that the Eucharist is a gift of unity and not a means of unity.

We remind our faithful and visitors of the following guidelines concerning the Holy Sacraments in the Orthodox Church.

- Orthodox Christians are urged to receive Holy Communion frequently.
- Communicants should be at peace with others before approaching the chalice(Mt 5:23-24)
- Realize the importance of making a thorough examination of sins and transgressions against God, ourselves and others and having prayed for forgiveness before coming to Holy Communion.
- Frequent communicants should come to Holy Confession at least four times a year (during the four fasting periods of the year). and additionally when an examination of conscience reveals the necessity to do so in order to heal any sinful behavior.
- Communicants should fast from all foods and liquids from the evening before receiving Holy Communion.
- Communicants should read prayers in preparation for receiving Holy Communion.
- ❖ All Orthodox Christians must receive the sacraments at least once a year.
- Those who are late for Divine Liturgy (after the reading of the Epistle and Gospel) should not approach the chalice.
- Those who are ill or who have special physical needs are exempt from the above guidelines.
- Infants and children (up to the age of seven) who are Orthodox Christians may receive Holy Communion and are exempt from the above guidelines.

Thank you for gathering to worship with us today. Together we have glorified the One God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. May we be brought closer to one another and closer to God by following the eternal teachings of our Lord.

тим, хто часто причащається, слід приходити на святу сповідь принаймні чотири рази на рік (під час кожного із чотирьох щорічних постів);





Sponsor-A-Day Program Update

At last month's annual meeting, the Parish Council accepted the 2024 Finance Committee recommendations to NOT raise the 2025 member obligations and TO CONTINUE the Sponsor a Day Program in 2025 again and made that recommendation to the parishioners at the annual meeting which passed unanimously. Last year the 2024 Sponsor a Day Program raised over \$18,000. This program funded the church's General Fund to help in paying the churches operating expenses such as the church utility bills, salaries, insurances, operational costs and other regularly occurring invoices for the church, rectory and hall. In 2023, it cost approximately \$450 per day to operate the church, hall and rectory and those costs continued to go up in 2024. St. Hilary of Poitiers – "the Hammer of the Arians"

St. Hilary of Poitiers was a defender of the Orthodox faith during the struggle of the Church with the Arian heresy in the fourth century.

Hilary was born in Poitiers around 315, the son of aristocratic pagan parents in the portion of the Roman Empire called Gaul. His life at first took the normal course for someone of his station – he was educated, became an orator, married, and had a daughter. Then Hilary began a long period of study, searching for Truth and meaning in life. Among other things, he began reading the Christian Church's Holy Scriptures and became convinced that therein lay the answers to his questions. He came to believe that there is one transcendent God, that Jesus Christ was truly God, and that man must answer in the hereafter for his moral decisions in this life.

Hilary was baptized into the Church in 350, and only three years later, was elected bishop of the city of Poitiers. Despite his reluctance, Hilary accepted the responsibility and spent the fifteen years of his episcopacy defending the Catholic faith against the Arians.

Although the Council of Nicea, called by the Emperor Constantine in 325, began the formulation of the Nicene Creed, which clearly proclaimed the Church's teaching that the Son is "of one substance [essence] with the Father", and Arius' teachings against the divinity of Christ were defeated, Arius' followers did not give up their efforts to present Christianity in a way more palatable to the world. Their efforts were aided considerably when Constantine's sons succeeded him at his death. Constantius, ruler in the eastern portion of the empire, was inclined to Arian beliefs and sided with heretical



bishops and priests in the controversy that was growing. Hilary defended Orthodoxy at the Synod of Bitterae in 356 and refused to condemn Bishop Athanasius, the sometimes sole Orthodox leader in the East. Athanasius had been exiled numerous times and now, Constantius sent Hilary into exile in Phrygia for four years (356-360). During this time, the bishop wrote one of his major works, *On the Trinity*. In defiance of the Emperor, he attended a council in Seleucia in 359 to condemn Arianism. Constantius was soon compelled to allow Hilary to return to Gaul, where the people rejoiced to have discipline and Orthodoxy restored. In 364, the bishop traveled to Milan to argue successfully against its Arian bishop, Auxentius.

Although his life was completely dominated by the theological struggle of the day, St. Hilary's influence was felt in other areas of Church life as well. He encouraged St. Martin of Tours, another convert to Christianity, to establish a monastery in Liège and so was one of the founders of the monastic movement in the West. His other writings include commentaries on the Psalms and on the Gospel of Matthew, and he wrote hymns as a method of teaching.

St. Hilary fell asleep in the Lord in Poitiers in 368. St. Gregory of Tours, writing two hundred years later in his *History of the Frankish People*, describes him at his death: "St. Hilary went up to heaven, full of holiness and faith, and famous for his many miracles." Called the "hammer of the Arians" for his lifetime of opposition to the Arian heresy, St. Hilary was described by St. Jerome as "a fair cedar transplanted out of this world into the Church" and St. Augustine called him an "illustrious teacher" of the Church. St. Hilary's feast day is January 14. We give praise to God for his saints who help to show us the way.

IOCC Emergency Response Update

Los Angeles Wildfires

On January 7, a wildfire was ignited in the Pacific Palisades area of Los Angeles that grew into a massive fire which so far has burned more than 23,000 acres. Another fire near Pasadena also ignited on Tuesday, burning at least 14,000 acres. Other fires have also broken out in the region, though their damage has been less significant thus far.



Emergency Response Update

Communication and coordination are underway with Orthodox dioceses on the west coast. Trained IOCC staff and Frontliners are on the ground and coordinating with Orthodox parishes in the affected areas to offer emotional and spiritual care (ESC), gathering information on local needs, and offering technical support to parishes who wish to assist their communities. This includes guidance on organizing and managing resources, operating as respite centers or shelters, as well as help in coordinating with FEMA, local emergency authorities, and other volunteer groups.

IOCC Frontliners throughout the country are also ready to respond where unmet needs are reported. Please continue to pray for those who lost their lives, those affected by the fires, as well as the first responders and rescuers.

The holiday season brought a special kind of magic to the lives of 20 children supported by DTCare's art therapy programs in Lviv and Odesa. These children had the incredible opportunity to participate in the "Warm Hands" winter camp organized by the NGO "Piaternia" in the Volyn region of Ukraine.

The 10-day camp offered a much-needed respite from the ongoing challenges of war. Children engaged in a variety of enriching activities, including weaving Christmas spiders, creating pottery, painting T-shirts, and even cooking a traditional Ukrainian Christmas Eve dinner. The camp also included individual psychological consultations, providing a safe space for children to process their emotions and heal.

"Children of all ages felt comfortable here, were engaged and interested, and had a good time," shared Polina Bereziuk, our dedicated art therapist who accompanied the children. "On Christmas Day, we cooked dinner as if we were one big family. It was truly a heartwarming experience."

This camp provided an invaluable opportunity for children to connect with other children from across Ukraine, learn about Ukrainian traditions, and simply enjoy the magic of the holiday season.

We extend our sincere gratitude to NGO "Piaternia," especially Tetyana Myalkovska, for their generosity and for creating this unforgettable experience for our children. We also thank Care in Action and Polina Bereziuk for their invaluable support in organizing and accompanying the children.




